In the Midwest, he founded the Tonganoxie Community Theatre and Chatagua Players of Ottawa, KS. Mark has coordinated creative dramatics programs for twenty private schools and has directed and acted in over 120 productions in community theatre, summer stock and academic theatre. He is currently the Director of Theatre at SM South.

MARY LOU JONES has played in the orchestras of Theatre in the Park productions since 1979. "A CHORUS LINE" is her second Park show as conductor, having begun with last year's "WIZARD OF OZ." Currently a member of the Board of Directors of the KC Youth Symphony, she is Doctoral student at UMKC and teaches orchestra at SM South, as well as conducting the school's musical productions.

ANN PINKERTON is choreographing her fifth show at Theatre in the Park. Having trained at Miller Marley Dance Studio, Ann has either choreographed or danced with the KC Chiefettes, Worlds of Fun, Starlight Theatre, Omni Awards and Rock Chalk Review at the University of Kansas. She is the founder of the Kansas Crimson Girls at KU and has been Miller Marley's Advanced Jazz Teacher for three years. Ann is a senior at KU, majoring in Recreation Management.

JEFF MARTIN is currently Director of both the New Spirit Singers and One Voice (the Village Church Youth and Singles Choirs.) Early this year, he was Vocal Director for "FIDDLER ON THE ROOF" at SM South and directed Combined Jr. High Choir at the District Choral Festival. Jeff has performed throughout the Midwest and South and teaches voice privately. "A CHORUS LINE" is his Theatre in the Park debut.

TERESAS. PRUITT has proven to be quite versatile within her involvement in Park productions. "A CHORUS LINE" is her fifth Park show as stage manager. In addition, she is also our costumer and a member of the construction crew for the four Park musicals this year. Teresa is a student at Washburn University, where she is just as active in theatre, working toward a BA in Theatre and a BFA in Art.

RICK RASMUSSEN comes to us from the Helen Hocker Performing Arts Technical Center in Topeka, having served two years as Set Designer and Technical Director. He has designed scenery and costumes for "HELLO DOLLY," "OLIVER" and "AIN'T MISBEHAVIN'." Rick has received prizes from the Mid America Theatre Conference Design Competitions and, in addition to scenery work, he has directing to his credit. Rick received a Master of Fine Arts from the University of Kansas.

PHILIP KINEN is in his second year as Assistant Producer for Theatre in the Park. He appeared as Hysterium in the Park's production of "A FUNNY THING HAPPENED ON THE WAY TO THE FORUM." Last year, he designed sets for "HOW TO SUCCEED IN BUSINESS" and "A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM," which was nominated for Best Set by the Kansas City Best of '86 Theatre Awards.
