PRODUCTION STAFF BIOGRAPHIES

MARK SWEZEY is directing his seventh Theatre in the Park show. Originally from New York, Mark attended St. John's University and worked at the famed Cafe La Mama off-Broadway theatre. In the Midwest, he founded the Tonganoxie Community Theatre and Chatagua Players of Ottawa, Kansas. Mark has coordinated creative dramatics programs for 20 private schools and has directed and acted in over 130 productions in community theatre, summer stock and academic theatre. Last summer, he directed "A Chorus Line," given the Best of Theatre 87 award as best community theatre production. Mark is Director of Theatre at Shawnee Mission South.

CRIS KELLY has studied and performed with several companies and choreographers throughout the Midwest. She is a member of the Kansas City Royale Entertainers and appeared on the Miss Missouri stage in 1987. She is co-choreographer for the Miss Kansas City Pageant 1988, and last appeared at the Park as Judy in "A Chorus Line." Highlights for Cris include dancing in the "Poetry in Motion" concert with Ralph Glenmore of the Alvin Ailey Company and her dance appearance in the new movie release "Reunion." Cris is married and has two children.

CONNIE BURK has remained involved in theatre at Shawnee Mission South since graduating two years ago. Currently a junior at KU, majoring in education, she served as Artistic Supervisor for four of the high school's productions this past year. In addition to her work on "Cabaret," she is a member of the construction crew for the four Park musicals this year. Connie plans to join the Peace Corps after graduation and eventually teach a bilingual program here in the U.S.

A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Have you ever considered the consequences of denying the evil that exists in our world? Throughout history, people have chosen to bury their heads in the sand or seek pleasure, instead of doing what they could to solve society's problems.

The Germans who lived in the economically-depressed Berlin of 1929 were encouraged to "leave their troubles behind" and eat, drink and be merry at nightspots and cabarets. They chose to blind themselves to the growing power of the Nazi machine. Most Germans never imagined that the steady encroachment of a new philosophy could result in atrocities of such magnitude. In the initial stages, they saw only what they wanted to see—that Adolph Hitler was a charismatic leader, almost hypnotic with his promises to restore the German pride and economy. The consequence of this blindness was the extermi-

nation of millions of their German countrymen.

In the years since 1930, our world has not become immune to the social and political ills which plagued Berlin. We may not feel affected by the terrorism, anti-Semitism, racism and famine which we see on the 6:00 news; we may feel inclined to put our blinders on securely, in the belief that these tragedies will never touch our lives.

There is, however, a hope for the future, to which every generation has clung. It is the hope that we see in the bright face of our children. It is up to each of us to decide how we want to live and teach the next generation. We can decide to begin now in some way, or we can do like Herr Schultz in Act II, Scene 2 and simply pull down the blinds. The choice is ours. Is life nothing more than a cabaret, old chum?
